PROCEDURE FOR HEARINGS - LICENSING ACT 2003

The Licensing Committee

The full Licensing Committee consists of fifteen elected Members of the Council. From this full Committee will be drawn sub-committees of three members to deal with licensing functions under the Licensing Act 2003. The Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Licensing Committee shall have the discretion to refer a matter up to a hearing of the full Licensing Committee.

Officers at Hearings

- The Committee Officer introduces all parties and records the proceedings
- **The Legal Adviser** provides independent advice to the Members on legal matters and procedure.
- **The Licensing Officer** will introduce the matter and outline the application; the officer will also answer any questions Members may have.

PROCEDURE

NOTE: If the Sub-Committee has not already elected a Chairman, that will be the first item of business.

1	Chairman	The Chairman will: (i) call the matter to be considered; (ii) call for any declarations of interest; (iii) ask all parties to introduce themselves; (iv) summarise the procedure to be followed at the hearing; (v) will consider any request made by a party for another person to appear at the hearing; (v) will advise the parties of any maximum period of time in which it has to present its case (if a maximum is imposed this shall be equal for all parties).
2	Licensing Officer	Will introduce and summarise the application, highlighting areas of contention or dispute.
3	Committee Members	May ask questions of the Licensing Officer
4	Applicant	Will present his/her case, calling witnesses, as appropriate. (If necessary, applicant will produce any notices required by law. Legal Adviser will draw attention to this if required.)
5	Responsible Authorities (who have made representations)	Each in turn may ask <u>questions</u> of the applicant, by way of clarification.

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6	Local residents (ie. defined as "interested parties")	To be invited to ask <u>questions</u> of the applicant, by way of clarification.	
	"interested parties")	It is normal practice for a spokesperson only to speak on behalf of a group of residents.	
7	Committee Members	Each in turn may ask <u>questions</u> of the applicant.	
8	Applicant	May make a <u>statement</u> or ask his witnesses to clarify any matters which he feels are unclear, or may have been misunderstood.	
9	Responsible Authorities	Will make their representations.	
10	Applicant	Or his representative or witnesses to ask <u>questions</u> of Responsible Authorities represented at the meeting, by way of clarification.	
11	Local residents (ie. defined as "interested parties")	May ask <u>questions</u> of the Responsible Authorities represented at the meeting, by way of clarification. (Note: This is not the point at which local residents should be stating their objections.)

17	Chairman	To invite both Responsible Authorities and Local Residents to make their closing addresses.

20	Committee	Will return to give its decision, with reasons, which will be announced by the Chairman and subsequently confirmed in writing to the applicant and to all the parties that made representations.	

In cases where a decision cannot be given at the hearing, parties will be advised of the decision working days.	
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<u>Notes</u>

- 1. The hearing shall normally be held in public. There may be occasions on which the Committee find it necessary to exclude members of the press and public; any such decision will be taken on the basis that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing taking place in public.
- 2. The Chairman may require any person behaving in a disruptive manner to leave the hearing and may (a) refuse to permit that person to return, or (b) permit him/her to return only on such conditions as the authority may specify, but any such person may submit in writing any information which they would have been entitled to provide orally if they had not been required to leave.
- 3. Prior to the hearing each party shall have given notification and served documentation (eg statements of witnesses or reports of experts) as required. Late representations and evidence will only be considered with the agreement of all parties.
- 4. Anyone entitled to be heard may be represented by any person, whether or not that person is legally qualified.
- 5. Hearsay will be permitted but the Sub-Committee will be reminded to give it appropriate weight.
- 6. Due note shall be taken of the provisions of the Hearings Regulations 2005.
- 7. The Chair may, in the interests of expediency or convenience of the parties, vary the procedure from time to time, provided notice is given to the parties and the rules of natural justice are observed.

- **8** Responsible Authorities to make their representations following which they can be questioned by all parties by way of clarification.
- **9 Local residents** (defined as interested parties) will be invited to present the bases of their objections, following which they can be questioned by all parties by way of clarification.
- 10 The applicant will be invited to sum up his/her case
- 11 Committee/Sub-Committee withdraws to make its decision
- 12 Committee/Sub-Committee returns to announce its decision to all present.

From the end of permitted hours on New Years Eve to the commencement of permitted hours on New Years Day.

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Provision of facilities for entertainment similar to music and dance (to take place indoors only) Monday to Sunday 20.00 to 23.30

From the end of permitted hours on New Years Eve to the commencement of permitted hours on New Years Day.

Other times the premises are proposed to be open:

Monday to Saturday 11.00 to 01.30 Sunday 12.00 to 00.30

From the end of permitted hours on New Years Eve to the commencement of permitted hours on New Years Day.

Background:

The Ox-Fford Public House has applied for a variation to their existing licence to allow live music to be played indoors seven days a week from 20:00 – 23:15.

The current premises licence does not allow live music at any time.

Previous Complaint History:

This office received two complaints on 29 June 2009 alleging a noise disturbance caused by loud music played outdoors. The outdoor event was covered by a TEN, and took place on 27 June 2009.

An additional complaint was received on 7 August 2009 concerning music noise from the premises, and vandalism in the area.

As a result of the complaints and as part of the investigation a multi agency visit was made to the premises on 8 September 2009. Discussions were held with Mr Cavanagh regarding managing the impact of noise and people when leaving the premises.

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Since these events, there have been 4 live music events at the premises, covered under temporary event notifications, all of which finished at 23:00 hours;

26 September 2009 Live Music Night
3 October 2009 Karaoke Night
9 October 2009 Live Music Night
17 October 2009 Acoustic Band

This office has not received complaints relating to any of the above events.

Current Application

Following the application for a variation, a visit was made to the premises. It is noted the premises has thermal double glazing only, and does not benefit from air conditioning.

Previous complaints indicate there is potential for noise to cause a disturbance, however the only complaint received in this office relating to live music concerned an outdoor event.

I am mindful, however, that on four occasions since the initial complaints were received, the applicant has held live music events inside the premises until 23:00, which have not generated complaint. All these events were held on a Friday or Saturday.

With this in mind, and on balance, in order to safeguard the residents from public nuisance, it would be considered reasonable to grant a variation with the following hours:

Sunday to Thursday: 20:00 - 22:00 **Friday and Saturday:** 20:00 - 23:00

In addition, in order to mitigate potential noise issues during the above hours, a condition should be attached to ensure that doors and windows are kept closed whilst live music is taking place.

Recommendation

This office would not object to the application for a variation to the hours outlined above, subject to the attachment of a condition ensuring that doors and windows remain closed whilst live music is played.

It is understood the above is agreeable to the applicant.

Dear Sir,

I am writing to express my objection to the Ox-fford Public House being granted a seven day entertainment licence. The reasons for this objection are set out below taking into consideration the prevention of crime and disorder and the prevention of public nuisance.

The Ox-fford pub is located in a primarily residential setting, if these premises are granted a licence to provide entertainment in whatever form 7 days a week, excessive noise is inevitable.

Parking is already extremely difficult on Beswick Street for residents the additional pressure due to entertainment at the pub which does not have parking provision will lead to increased difficulties for local residents.

Currently the patrons leave the above mentioned public house at all hours of the night, many excessively intoxicated. Shouting and fighting have occurred on the road outside our home into the early hours, this is bad enough over the weekend but it is totally unacceptable during the week.

Both my partner and I have to get up early in the morning due to the nature of our jobs and we do not want to be disturbed from the noise created by people leaving the pub in the early hours.

In all I strongly believe that granting a 7 day entertainment licence to The Ox-fford premises will cause a public nuisance and excessive noise in a generally quiet residential area of Macclesfield.





I understand that the Ox-Fford Public House on Oxford Road has recently applied for a 7-day music licence to allow live music to be played on the premises 7 days a week.

As a resident living I wish to strongly object to the potential issuing of this licence. The area surrounding the pub is solely a residential area. Allowing live music 7-days a week will have an extremely detrimental effect on residents' quality of life. If there are any families living nearby with young children this will affect their sleep patterns and therefore the children's development and general welfare. I believe the current landlords of the Ox-Fford themselves have small children so I would also question the effects this would have on their own childrens' welfare.

There is also already a problem with cars parking directly on the pavements surrounding the pub which constitutes illegal parking, the music licence may well increase the number of cars parking illegally in the area.

the pub garden, I feel strongly that if the pub is allowed to hold live music events any day of the week, this will cause increased noise pollution in a residential area and in turn cause myself and other residents great distress.

I hope that my objections and objections from other residents will be taken into consideration when deciding what benefits there would be to the local community if a licence is issued to the Ox-Fford pub.

I do object to the granting of the variation - the one sought bu the pub and the proposed compromise.

- 1 This is a residential area many houses locally with small children and most of us with jobs we do not need to have our lives disrupted by late night drinking and music and the associated noise outside the pub. When people come out the noise wakes us up on a very regular basis. Drunken people shouting and screaming.
- 2 Parking here is simply hell during the evenings. The pub has no parking and cars clog up the streets. I would never dare to leave my car parked at the front of the house due to the likely damage from the people leaving the pub.
- 3 I have called the police and reported the pub to the council once. It could have been 6 or 7 times more. It happens at least once per fortnight.
- 4 I have called the police myself twice in the last few months due to trouble caused by the pub. I have also been into the council to complain and spoken to environmental health due to the noise. Please check your records. The noise that led to my first complaint was tremendous blaring out until after midnight sometimes it has continued until 1am.

 I understand that at that time the pub had already been warned about the noise/open windows etc but it is obvious that they ignored this.

 You will see that on the date of my visit to the council I was also reporting the damage caused to the large flowerbed by the drunken youths coming out of the pub at about midnight. They rolled around and destroyed the flowerbed and could not even stand up they were so drunk. They were noisy vandals and should have been refused further alcohol many drinks earlier. They left after half an hour of crawling around and damaging property, in a taxi. I reported the taxi number to the police but I dont know if any action was taken. The flowerbed was ruined for the next 2 months.
- 5 On the 25/9 the pub had a party with live music it is usually Karaoke which causes the noise... When the karaoke stopped at approximately 11.30pm and for an hour or so we were treated to the spectacle of approximately 50 youths staggering about screaming, sitting on our doorstep trying to vomit, ripping our neighbour's cable to box off the wall and, again, crawling around so drunk they could not even stand up. I work with Children and Young People and many of these youths appeared to be underage. It is also an offence to serve alcohol to someone who is intoxicated.

6 The proposed compromise will not work - I have no objections to the 11pm Friday and Saturday, but not mid week. The parking issues and the noise as people leave the pub will be the same midweek. They also do not learn from warnings - there were 3 incidents in the 3 weeks following my visit to the council and the warnings which the man from Environmental Health said he and the police would make. The problems still continue.

In summary, the pub as it is at present is a problem on some nights - with longer hours I believe this will simply be much worse. If they want a pub with this level of noise they should seek a pub which is not in the middle of a residential area. The Ox-Fford was always a good local pub but has over the last year deteriorated into a noisy, offensive neighbour - with disrupted sleep, damage to property and a very bad reputation locally. I complained about the pub before this licence application and am staggered that the local authority are considering granting it with the level of local opposition and the number of complaints.

I am frankly amazed that anyone could suggest this 2) there are several groups of people; children, the elderly, the sick and shift workers who will be trying to get to sleep before 22.00 hours. This cut-off point does not seem to me to be either relevant or reasonable. The Oxford pub is set directly amongst lives of ferrared houses with no grounds of its own. The noise directly affects the surrounding homes.

I am writing to state my objection to the current extended music license application made by the Oxfford Pub.

I have lived on Beswick Street (makes) the Oxfford Pub) for 6 years and during this time I have been witness to customers of the pub fighting, shouting, swearing, vomiting, urinating and revving car/bike engines outside my house. These events often occur in the small hours of the morning and the noise is made worse by the particular acoustics of this area, in that any noise is amplified off the surrounding houses. Due to the smoking ban customers often congregate in large groups in the street outside of my house and even when the yard of The Oxfford is used for smoking purposes the noise is again amplified by the surrounding walls of the yard and can be heard very clearly by the large number of residents in the area from within our houses.

Although I understand that The Oxfford is a licensed pub it is also situated in a highly residential area whose occupants are wholly effected by the behaviour of some of the pubs customers. Macclesfield has a large number of town centre entertainment establishments which I suggest are better positioned for late night music entertainment and where any trouble may also be easily policed. In the past I have also witnessed fights that have spilled into the path of oncoming cars on Oxfford Road.

In past years The Oxfford pub has been a respectable local pub where people can enjoy a drink and in this context I have no objection to the pubs license. However I believe the extension of the existing license will have a detrimental effect on the local area by increasing the amount of antisocial behaviour that myself and my neighbours are continuously subject to, and in turn will have a further negative effect on the local community.

The reasons for our objection are as follows

- 1. The Oxx Ford is situated in a residential area and has absolutely no parking facilities of its own what so ever. As it is the parking in the Oxford Road and Beswick Street area is extremely limited due to double yellow lines on one side of Beswick Street. Residents currently find it difficult to park as it is without any more vehicles trying to park. Also vehicles can only park on one side of Oxford Road which causes additional parking problems as residents from both sides of the road have to use one side of the road.
- 2. The noise levels from the proposed late night 7 days a week live music and dancing would be totally unacceptable in a residential area. Noise levels would make sleep difficult and also would probably affect the values of property in close proximity to the public house.
- 3. The grass and flower border in front of the Oxx Ford has been vandalised by late night revellers and as a rate payer we and we are sure we speak for others resent paying money to improve the look of somewhere only for drunken people to wreck the flower borders.

We trust that our objection will be registered and taken very seriously before any decision is made on the application.

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



 - (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the Premises Licence, or
 - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a Personal Licence or his Personal Licence is suspended.
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under this Premises Licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a Personal Licence.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with the Operating Schedule

Prevention of Crime and Disorder

Public Safety

- 1. Fire exits shall be clearly signed and lit
- 2. Fire fighting equipment and emergency lighting will be checked regularly.

Prevention of Public Nuisance

3. There shall be a notice asking the patrons to leave quietly.

Protection of Children from Harm

- 4. Children accompanied by an adult will only allowed in the beer garden and no smoking dart room.
- 5. Children will not be allowed in the vicinity of the AWP machine.
- 6. There shall be a proof of age scheme in place, all staff will be trained to observe and carry out this practice.

General - All Licensing Objectives

- 7. Where there is provided in the Premises an entertainment for children, or an entertainment at which the majority of the persons attending are children, then, if the number of children attending the entertainment exceeds one hundred, it shall be the duty of the person providing the entertainment to station and keep stationed wherever necessary a sufficient number of adult attendants, properly instructed as to their duties, to prevent more children or other persons being admitted to the building, or to any part thereof, than the building or part can properly accommodate, and to control the movement of the children and other persons admitted while entering and leaving the building or any part thereof, and to take all other reasonable precautions for the safety of the children
- 8. Where the occupier of the Premises permits, for hire or reward, the Premises to be used for the purpose of an entertainment, he shall take all reasonable steps to secure the observance of the provisions of condition 7 above.
- 9. No person under fourteen shall be in the bar of the licensed premises during the permitted hours unless one of the following applies:

- (1) He is the child of the holder of the premises licence.
- (2) He resides in the premises, but is not employed there.
- (3) He is in the bar solely for the purpose of passing to or from some part of the premises which is not a bar and to or from which there is no other convenient means of access or egress.
- (4) The bar is in railway refreshment rooms or other premises constructed, fitted and intended to be used bona fide for any purpose to which the holding of the licence is ancillary.



But an area is not a bar when it is usual for it to be, and it is, set apart for the service of table meals and alcohol is only sold or supplied to persons as an ancillary to their table meals.
