PROCEDURE FOR HEARINGS - LICENSING ACT 2003

The Licensing Committee

The full Licensing Committee consists of fifteen elected Members of the Council. From this full Committee will be drawn sub-committees of three members to deal with licensing functions under the Licensing Act 2003. The Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Licensing Committee shall have the discretion to refer a matter up to a hearing of the full Licensing Committee.

Officers at Hearings

- The Committee Officer introduces all parties and records the proceedings
- **The Legal Adviser** provides independent advice to the Members on legal matters and procedure.
- **The Licensing Officer** will introduce the matter and outline the application; the officer will also answer any questions Members may have.

PROCEDURE

NOTE: If the Sub-Committee has not already elected a Chairman, that will be the first item of business.

1	Chairman	The Chairman will: (i) call the matter to be considered; (ii) call for any declarations of interest; (iii) ask all parties to introduce themselves; (iv) summarise the procedure to be followed at the hearing; (v) will consider any request made by a party for another person to appear at the hearing; (v) will advise the parties of any maximum period of time in which it has to present its case (if a maximum is imposed this shall be equal for all parties).
2	Licensing Officer	Will introduce and summarise the application, highlighting areas of contention or dispute.
3	Committee Members	May ask questions of the Licensing Officer
4	Applicant	Will present his/her case, calling witnesses, as appropriate. (If necessary, applicant will produce any notices required by law. Legal Adviser will draw attention to this if required.)
5	Responsible Authorities (who have made representations)	Each in turn may ask <u>questions</u> of the applicant, by way of clarification.

6	Local residents (ie. defined as "interested parties")	To be invited to ask <u>questions</u> of the applicant, by way of clarification.			
	"interested parties")	It is normal practice for a spokesperson only to speak on behalf of a group of residents.			
7	Committee Members	Each in turn may ask <u>questions</u> of the applicant.			
8	Applicant	May make a <u>statement</u> or ask his witnesses to clarify any matters which he feels are unclear, or may have been misunderstood.			
9	Responsible Authorities	Will make their representations.			
10	Applicant	Or his representative or witnesses to ask <u>questions</u> of Responsible Authorities represented at the meeting, by way of clarification.			
11	Local residents (ie. defined as "interested parties")	May ask <u>questions</u> of the Responsible Authorities represented at the meeting, by way of clarification. (Note: This is not the point at which local residents should be stating their objections.)			
12	Committee Members	May ask <u>questions</u> of the Responsible Authorities represented at the meeting			
13	Local residents (ie. defined as "interested parties")	The local residents who are objecting to the application will be invited to make observations on the application and present the bases of their objections.			
15	Applicant	Or his representative or witnesses may ask <u>questions</u> of the Local Residents, by way of clarification.			
16	Committee Members	May ask <u>questions</u> of the Local Residents.			
17	Chairman	To invite both Responsible Authorities and Local Residents to make their closing addresses.			
18	Applicant	Or his representative will <u>briefly summarise the application</u> and comment on the observations and any suggested conditions.			
19	Committee	Will retire to consider the application. The Committee may request the Legal Advisor to advise on legal issues.			
20	Committee	Will return to give its decision, with reasons, which will be announced by the Chairman and subsequently confirmed in writing to the applicant and to all the parties that made representations.			

In cases where a decision cannot be given at the hearing, parties will be advised of the decision working days.	
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<u>Notes</u>

- 1. The hearing shall normally be held in public. There may be occasions on which the Committee find it necessary to exclude members of the press and public; any such decision will be taken on the basis that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing taking place in public.
- 2. The Chairman may require any person behaving in a disruptive manner to leave the hearing and may (a) refuse to permit that person to return, or (b) permit him/her to return only on such conditions as the authority may specify, but any such person may submit in writing any information which they would have been entitled to provide orally if they had not been required to leave.
- 3. Prior to the hearing each party shall have given notification and served documentation (eg statements of witnesses or reports of experts) as required. Late representations and evidence will only be considered with the agreement of all parties.
- 4. Anyone entitled to be heard may be represented by any person, whether or not that person is legally qualified.
- 5. Hearsay will be permitted but the Sub-Committee will be reminded to give it appropriate weight.
- 6. Due note shall be taken of the provisions of the Hearings Regulations 2005.
- 7. The Chair may, in the interests of expediency or convenience of the parties, vary the procedure from time to time, provided notice is given to the parties and the rules of natural justice are observed.

- **9 Local residents** (defined as interested parties) will be invited to present the bases of their objections, following which they can be questioned by all parties by way of clarification.
- 10 The applicant will be invited to sum up his/her case
- 11 Committee/Sub-Committee withdraws to make its decision
- 12 Committee/Sub-Committee returns to announce its decision to all present.

Sub-section 35(4) provides that the authority may (a) modify the conditions of the licence; or (b) reject the whole or part of the application.

- 11.2 Summary of proposed changes:
 - (i) To add the 'Live Music' (indoors) activity to the licence;
 - (ii) to add the 'Provision of late night refreshment' activity;
 - (iii) to extend the times for the sale of alcohol.; and
 - (iv) to extend the opening times of the premises.

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises licence:
 - a) At a time when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor in respect of the Premises licence, or
 - b) At a time when the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal licence, or his/her Personal licence is suspended.
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the Premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a Personal licence.

<u>Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Licensing Conditions) Order 2010</u> The following conditions are effective from 06 April 2010:

3. The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

An irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children-

- a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-
 - drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - ii. drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed price or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Licensing Act);
- c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;
- d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where the provision is dependent on
 - i. the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or (Continued on page 4)

- ii. the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
- e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
- 4. The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 5. The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

The following conditions are effective from 01 October 2010:

- a) The premises licence holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - b) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.
- 7. The responsible person shall ensure that
 - a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures
 - i. beer or cider: half pint;
 - ii. gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - iii. still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
 - b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with Operating Schedule

- 1. No nuisance shall be caused by noise coming from the premises.
- 2. Refuse such as bottles shall be disposed of from the premises at a time (i.e. between 8:00 and 20:00 when it is not likely to cause a disturbance to residents in the vicinity of the premises.
- 3. There shall be placed at all exits from the premises, in a place where they can be seen and easily read by the public, notices requiring customers to leave the premises and the area quietly.
- 4. No music to be played in the outside seating area.
- 5. The Premises licence holder will ensure that the proof of age scheme Challenge 25 is operated for all sales of alcohol and must also ensure all individuals authorised to sell alcohol are trained in its operation.
- 6. The hours for sale of alcohol and opening hours may be extended as follows:

New Year's Eve

Sale of alcohol: 08:00 to 02:00 on New Year's Day. Opening hours: 08:00 to 02:30 on New Year's Day.

Application for extension of hours at Jax Restaurant, Wrexham Road, Bulkeley

We understand that the applicants Mr and Mrs Brian Foster are applying for an extension of opening hours on the above premise over and beyond what was originally approved when planning permission was granted for the opening of a Farm Shop and Tea Room.

We the undersigned oppose the granting of such an extension on the basis that the serving of alcohol is associated with the Restaurant for which no planning permission has been granted.

The planning authority specifically restricted the opening hours of the original Tea Room/Farm Shop on the grounds of noise and disturbance of local residents etc.

We would ask that the above factors and the supporting evidence attached herewith are taken into account when the application is considered.

For the Attention Mr P Simester

Licence Application for Extended Hours at Jax Restaurant, Bulkeley, Cheshire

We would raise the following concerns:

1. There is an increased possibility of late night disturbance much to the detriment of the local residents, due to large numbers of people arriving for music events.

It was a condition of the granting of planning permission for the Farm Shop that the site should not operate between the hours of 6pm and 10pm to protect the living conditions of local residents. Nothing has changed within that area to remove that requirement.

2. There is an increased possibility of disturbance from loud music. There has already been a live music event at the site which led to numerous complaints including calls to the Police.

We understand that future events are to be held within the house with doors and windows closed.

The premises are situated in a very quiet country area where sound travels at night, the building is old and not purpose built and unless there is air conditioning present it will become, very quickly, necessary for doors and windows to be opened for ventilation.

It will be nearly impossible to police whether the doors and windows are open at the premises as the building is situated back from the, unlit, main road.

There is already a facility for music and a bar at the Bickerton Village Hall and a public house which has music events just up the road.

3. There is an increased risk of traffic accidents as access to the site is poor onto a busy 'A' road which is unlit and the problem will be exacerbated by the potential numbers of vehicles entering and leaving the site. There is also limited parking available and any parking on the unlit main road would constitute a serious danger.

STATEMENT OF HARM

1.Activities: There has been a fundamental change of use from a tea room/farm shop to a Country Restaurant and Wine Bar with associated live music.

- The planning conditions attached to the tea shop and farm shop in 2008, indicated that the site should not operate or be open to the public between the hours of 6pm and 10am, to protect the living conditions of the occupants of nearby residential property, of which a number are in close proximity.
- Notwithstanding this concern for local residents, the unauthorised restaurant is operating in the evenings and is advertised openly. A copy of the most recent advertisement is attached herewith.
- An extremely loud live music event, associated with the restaurant, was held on the site on 9th
 September 2010, immediately generating local community representations (including calls to the police) opposing this totally unacceptable activity not only in terms of
 - o noise disturbance which precluded normal conversation in homes across the village,
 - o danger from traffic generated using the unauthorised access.
 - Similar events are now being advertised as a programme of live music events on this site.
 This event caused upset and distress to a number of people within the village community.

2.Vehicular Access onto A534: This unauthorised development in open space has been compounded by an unauthorised vehicular access being formed, from a pedestrian garden gate. We would like to draw your attention to the following:-

- Access was previously rejected by the local authority and a planning inspector as "dangerous for access to a single dwelling".
- Without reference to this history, the local authority granted consent in 2008 for a "farm shop and tea room", generating more traffic than would have been generated by the single dwelling previously considered unacceptable.
- The highway authority in commenting on this 2008 "farm shop and tea room" application
 indicated that the access was poor, but raised no objection because of an erroneous (unchecked)
 assumption that the "existing" vehicular access and business on the site had consent.
- The unauthorised access is not only generating traffic from the commercial activities, but the
 original single dwelling complex has been split, with a converted barn now having exclusive use of
 the original historic access (the only one approved), with Yew Tree House using the unauthorised
 access.

Planning History - You Tree House, Whendron Road, Bulbeley SY1A SEX

Unauthorised development in the Open Countryside:

It is a matter of great concern to the members of the local community that the Local Authorities have failed to take planning enforcement action.

Cumulative developments have taken place in the garden of Yew Tree House without planning permission. These developments include buildings, hard areas, signs, vehicular access, and commercial activities including a restaurant and associated events. These developments have taken place, without planning consent, on a residential garden on which planning applications for a single dwelling have been refused, by the local authority and planning inspectors on appeal, to protect this land from development as open countryside and an integral part of the Area of Special County Value. Vital statements include:

Application P98/0057 - Dwelling refused on appeal on 9 December 1998. The Inspector concluded:

"...even though the appeal site forms part of the garden of Yew Tree House, it still lies within the open countryside and in the ASCV where it provides an important element of openness in the landscape which would be lost if your client's proposal were to be allowed. Many gardens contribute to the openness of the countryside and as such I consider that it should also be protected from development."

"Development on the appeal site would result in the urbanisation of the open gap through the provision of a dwelling on the site which would also be exacerbated by the need for an access onto the A534 road."


Application P06/0496 - Dwelling refused on appeal on 26 October 2007. The inspector concluded:

"I accept that the appeal site forms part of the garden of Yew Tree House and can be considered as previously developed land but it lies within the open countryside and in my opinion forms an important space along the Wresham Road. If it were to be developed it would reduce the open nature of the landscape that contributes to the form and character of the settlement and its setting beneath Builteley Hill."

"In conclusion therefore I consider that the proposal would extend the built up frontage and fill an important space to the detriment of the landscape of the open countryside and the character of the ASCV."

Reinforcing the currency of the above decisions, on 9 June 2010, Greg Clark MP. Minister of State at the Department for Communities and Local Government, unveiled plans to take gardens out of the brownfield category, strengthening the power of councils to prevent unwanted development on gardens where local people object in order to protect the character of their neighbourhoods.

- 9.0 Legal Implications (Authorised by the Borough Solicitor)
- 9.1 Where application for a review under section 51 of the Licensing Act 2003 is made, the licensing authority must hold a hearing within 20 working days (from the end of the consultation period) to consider the application and any relevant representations.
- 9.2 Section 52 of the Licensing Act 2003 states that, before determining the application, the licensing authority must hold a hearing to consider the application and any relevant representations. Sub-section 52(3) provides that the authority must, having regard to the application and any representations, take such steps detailed in sub-section (4), if any, as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The steps referred to in sub-section 52(4) are:
 - To modify the conditions of the licence;
 - To exclude a licensable activity from the scope of the licence;
 - To remove the Designated Premises Supervisor;
 - To suspend the licence for a period not exceeding three months:
 - To revoke the licence

10.0 Risk Management

10.1 Section 181 and Schedule 5 of the Licensing Act 2003 make provision for appeal to the Magistrates' Court of any decision made by the licensing authority.

11.0 Background and Options

- 11.1 Mr Gavin John Chamberlain became the licence holder at the Wilbraham Arms on 14 September 2009. He is also the Designated Premises Supervisor.
- 11.2 A copy of the Premises licence is attached as Appendix 1.
- 11.3 The Premises licence allows the public house to remain open until 01:30 each day. The sale of alcohol is permitted until 01:00 each day.
 - The following licensable activities are also permitted until 01:00 each day of the week: Live music, Recorded music, Films, Indoor sporting events, Performances of dance, Provision of facilities for making music, provision of facilities for dancing and late night refreshment.
- 11.4 On 14th October 2010 the licensing authority received an application from the Environmental Health team at Cheshire East Borough Council for the review of the

Premises licence. The review application states that the Environmental Health Service have received complaints from a number of residents regarding amplified music emanating from the premises and individuals within the rear yard creating excessive noise until the early hours of the morning.

A copy of the review application form is attached as Appendix 2.

11.5 In response to the notification of the proposed review, representations have been received from the Chief Officer of Police and from 15 interested parties residing in the vicinity of the premises. Details are attached as Appendix 3 (Police) and Appendix 4 (interested parties).

Annex 1 - Mandatory conditions

- 1. No supply of alcohol may be made under the Premises licence:
 - At a time when there is no Designated Premises Supervisor in respect of the Premises licence, or
 - At a time when the Designated Premises Supervisor does not hold a Personal licence, or his/her Personal licence is suspended.
- 2. Every supply of alcohol under the Premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a Personal licence.
- 3. The admission of children (i.e. persons under 18 years old) to the exhibition of a film is restricted in accordance with the recommendations given to the film by the British Board of Film Censors.

<u>Licensing Act 2003 (Mandatory Licensing Conditions) Order 2010</u> The following conditions are effective from 06 April 2010:

4. The responsible person shall take all reasonable steps to ensure that staff do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

An irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises in a manner which carries a significant risk of leading or contributing to crime and disorder, prejudice to public safety, public nuisance, or harm to children-

- a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to-
 - drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - ii. drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed price or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic (other than any promotion or discount available to an individual in respect of alcohol for consumption at a table meal, as defined in section 159 of the Licensing Act);
- c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less;

- d) provision of free or discounted alcohol in relation to the viewing on the premises of a sporting event, where the provision is dependent on
 - i. the outcome of a race, competition or other event or process, or
 - ii. the likelihood of anything occurring or not occurring;
- e) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
- 5. The responsible person shall ensure that no alcohol is dispensed directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 6. The responsible person shall ensure that free tap water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

The following conditions are effective from 01 October 2010:

- a) The premises licence holder shall ensure that an age verification policy applies to the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
 - b) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.
- 8. The responsible person shall ensure that
 - a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures
 - i. beer or cider: half pint;
 - ii. gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - iii. still wine in a glass: 125 ml; and
 - b) customers are made aware of the availability of these measures.

Annex 2 - Conditions consistent with Operating Schedule

- 1. No nuisance shall be caused by noise coming from the premises or by vibration transmitted through the structure of the premises.
- 2. Refuse such as bottles shall be disposed of from the premises at a time when it is not likely to cause a disturbance to residents in the vicinity of the premises.
- 3. There shall be placed at all exits from the premises, in a place where they can be seen and easily read by the public, notices requiring customers to leave the premises and the area quietly.
- 4. Children under the age of 16 are not permitted on the premises after 20:00.

5. Hotel residents:

The supply of alcohol and provision of hot food & drinks are available to residents of the hotel and their guests for 24 hours a day.



Please state the ground(s) for review (please read guidance note 1) The Wilbraham Arms has been the subject to an investigation by the Environmental Health Division following complaints from a number of residents regarding amplified music emanating from the premises and individuals within the rear yard creating excessive noise until the early hours of the morning.
Noise monitoring by the Division has clearly indicated a statutory nuisance existed with regards to both the amplified music and customers within the rear yard; both of which are causing a noise nuisance to other peoples enjoyment of their properties. Due to the management not taking responsibilty for the conduct of the premises and the customers both in and out of the premises this Division has served two abatement notices on the premises in order for the issues to be addressed and resolved.

Please provide as much information as possible to support the application (please read guidance note 2)

A number of complaints have been received from local residents with regards to amplified music and the conduct of customers within the rear yard of the premises till the early hours of the morning. This in turn raised concern with local residents in relation to the conduct of the management at the premises. Complaint received on 22/05/2010. Letter sent to the premises informing them of the complaint on 26/05/2010.

No response was received from the DPS/premises licence holder or any other member of staff from the premises in order to discuss the content of the letter.

Noise monitoring equipment was installed in one of the complainant's properties on 01/08/2010. The evidence gathered indicated that a statutory nuisance was present from individuals within the rear yard till the early hours of the morning. (The DAT recordings can be found attached to this form - DAT1). Amplified music was also clearly identifiable. A visit was made to the premises on Thursday 15th September 2010 accompanied by Allison Jackson (Licensing Officer) to discuss the evidence and the proposed changes that could be made. Mr Chamberlain stated that he wished for 2 weeks to prove he could manage the premises in an orderly manner.

Following on from listening to the results of the noise monitoring results the evidence clearly indicates that the noise from individuals within the smoking area is certainly a statutory nuisance as conversations can be heard word for word, laughing, shouting, cheering all of which is transcribed and attached to this file.

On one of the evenings music can be heard from the premises, every song could be identified and was able to identify the words in every song. The individual singing could be heard on the mic talking to the crowd encouraging them to sing along and can even be heard saying that he is going to have a break.

Following on from this the noise monitoring equipment being reinstalled into the complainants properties. One of the complainants properties captures the noise from the rear of the premises and other at the front. The evidence gathered as stated does indicate that a Statutory Nuisance is present.

A visit was made to see Gavin Chamberlain the licence holder and DPS of the Wilbraham Arms. Allison Jackson also attended to provide licensing information and assistance. Mr Chamberlain was informed that this Division is still continuing to receive complaints from local residents with regards to noise nuisance. His immediate reaction was that is was one household and that they had got it in for him. I informed Mr Chamberlain that there was more than one complainant and that we had got evidence of a noise nuisance emanating from his premises and therefore action was required to be taken.

Mr Chamberlain explained that he has on occasions been sat upstairs and heard the noise for himself to the point that it has made him cring. I informed Mr Chamberlain that if individuals outside shouting and talking etc is having that effect then he needs to be taking action. He seemed to be dismissive of this and felt as though the nature of some of the individuals would not be cooperative. I informed Mr Chamberlain that as the DPS and licence holder it is his responsibility to address the issue. He was questioned as to whether he has a refusals book and whether he challenges individuals for prove of ID. We were informed that he didn't and didn't need to have one.

Having looked around the premises, the front door was followed by another single

door creating a double door system in order to control noise. We were informed by Mr Chamberlain that the fire service had been to the premises and informed him that he need to make the current second door system into double doors for safe means of escape. At the rear of the premises was a single door right on the back wall which opened into the rear yard where benchs were present for people to sit. The door had recently been damaged slightly around the lock following a break in. On the left of the rear door was another single door which led through a small lobby to another single door on the side of the premises. I informed Mr Chamberlain that the current single door on the rear of the premises was adequate as when the door opens there would be straight transmission of noise. He informed me that he had recently spoken to the brewery who owns the premises and they had suggested there was the potential for the little lobby to be extended in order to make a double door system.

Mr Chamberlain explained that on a Friday and Saturday night he has a live band set up across the rear of the pub which raised concerns for myself as this was right across the rear entrance. On Sunday night he operates an open mic night.

I informed Mr Chamberlain that he needed to take more action and that he needed to take some actions these being:

- 1. Place signs at all exits asking for the customers to leave quietly and respect the neighbours.
- 2. Patrol the premises both at the front and rear and disperse large groups accordingly.
- 3. The rear gate to be closed at 10 pm as Mr Chamberlain alleged that people come through the alley and sit in the back yard.
- 4. No drinks to be taken outside after 9.30 pm and certainly for no vessels to be taken out of the front and on to the highway.
- 5. Informed Mr Chamberlain that it may be beneficial to have door staff in order to control individuals at the front and rear.
- 6. A diary to be maintained with regards to the actions he has taken to address any potential noise nuisance that is occurring.

I informed Mr Chamberlain that my current thoughts were to serve an Abatement Notice on him for the rear yard restricting the use. He requested that he be given a fortnight to show that he could control the noise and ensure that he doesn't cause a nuisance to the neighbouring properties. This was agreed however the noise monitoring equipment that has been installed into the properties will indicate if this has happened or not.

Since this visit this Division continued to receive complaints. Noise monitoring equipment was installed in complainant's properties one being at the front and the other at the rear. Having reviewed the evidence it is quite evident no controls have been implemented and a statutory nuisance is present from amplified music emanating from the premises, and customers within the rear yard till the early hours (Referece - DAT 2)

Therefore due to the lack of co-operation and the continuing disregard for the neighbouring residential properties, two abatement notices have been served on the premises.

- 1. Amplified music This notice has been served requiring that amplified music be abated in such a manner as to not cause a nuisance to neighbouring residential properties. This notice gives the premises 28 days to comply with the notice. The timescale for compliance in order for them to truly address the issue, structural work may/will be required and therefore due to financial implications they are allowed an appeal period to appeal against the notice.
- 2. Rear Yard An additional issue has been noise nuisance from customers

this issue. This abatement notice states that within one hour of the notice being served the licence holder is required to close the rear yard from 9 pm till 8 am, 7 days a week. Being mindful of the requirement for smoke provisions an additional condition on the notice is that no food or drink is to be taken out on to the front of the premises from 9 pm till 8 am, 7 days a week. The intention of detailing this requirement is so then customers don't group on the front of the premises whilst smoking.
The Environmental Health Division have wished to call the premises for review as stated for their disregard for local residential properties and lack of strength in the management to control both regulated entertainment from the premises and the conduct of the customers whilst present at the premises both internally and externally.

I visited the premises at 4.00pm on Wednesday 14th July 2010 after complaints of unreasonable noise emanating from the premises very late at night, spoke with the mother of Gavin John Chamberlain and asked her to let him know that I had visited and why. Uniformed Police officers have also attended at the premises a number of times in the last few months as a result of noise complaints from members of the public and drawn the attention of the management to these matters.

Please note that I do intend attending the review hearing on behalf of the Chief Officer of Police in order to amplify my representation and I look forward to hearing from you with details of when and where that hearing will be held.

Dear Mr. Simester,

I am writing to express my concern over the level of noise at The Wilbraham Arms. I have lived on Welsh Row for the past 12 years, and I have noticed a significant difference in both the level and the type of noise associated with the pub over the past 8 months. Loud music- especially on Sunday nights- prevent us from sleeping, and loud talking, singing, rowdy behaviour and fights outside the pub create a very a disturbing element to our street.

I am the home watch coordinator for our neighbourhood. Several of the elderly people on our street have told me that they feel vulnerable and threatened by the behaviour at the pub, yet also frightened to write in to complain.

I am asking that the landlord respect the tone of the neighbourhood - a residential part of town with many impressionable and vulnerable young people — by minimizing the loud music on week nights and maintaining a more commanding presence to control the rowdiness — carding young people, cutting off customers when they have had too much to drink and closing the pub on time. I would like the committee to recommend closing time of 11 pm on weeknights.

I believe that the situation has improved over the past couple of weeks – the music is currently played at a more acceptable level. It is also heading towards winter, and gatherings outside the pub are less frequent as the weather turns. My concern is that once the current attention to the pub has faded, that the condition will return – that of after-hours drinking and drunken behaviour. (In fact, Friday night (5 Nov) the pub was still open – with loud and argumentative people outside at 2:30 am. and on Sunday night the 7th, 3 women began a loud argument which escalated into pushing and shoving and involving 4 or 5 others – from 12:45 until 1:25am.) Several weeks ago, after 2:00 am on a Sunday night, it sounded like a woman was being beat up by a man and they were running and shouting back and forth across the street. The police arrived shortly after.

The picnic tables outside the pub exacerbate the problem, in my opinion. When the pub is open, people gather outside late at night, talking loudly. Even these past weeks while the pub has been operating under abatement notices requiring people to leave their drinks inside – and in spite of signs asking customers to do so – customers continue to drink outside (14 gathering and drinking at 1am on Sunday the 24th of Oct , 7 young people drinking outside on Sunday the 31st of Oct , again at 1 am. On Friday night the 5th of Nov, I noticed the landlord out on the steps of the pub having a cigarette. He completely ignored the 2 young men and a girl standing outside with cans of lager in their hands (11:15 pm).

When the pub is closed, people returning home from town often stop at the tables, at 2, 3, or 4 am – eating, talking loudly, singing, fighting, climbing on them, vomiting etc. My understanding from the highways department is that the tables are placed on highways land (in spite of their being placed on black bricks. Highways tell me that the entire pavement all the way up to the building belongs to their department.) Rob Welch, formally in highways, has told me that he had intended to have the

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tables removed. Clearly, in the current climate, tables on the pavement is not a high priority for the highways department. The committee's recommendation to have them removed would be welcomed.

I believe that one of the reasons why the pub was viewed positively in the neighbourhood in the past, was the strong presence of the landlord. He spent a large portion of the weekend nights out on the steps of the pub – gaining the respect of neighbours, and keeping customers on their best behaviour. He seemed to neutralize disagreements before they escalated, and he maintained excellent control over the environment. I suspect that he didn't serve young people, and that he stopped serving customers who were clearly drunk. There are clearly a lot more young people at the pub now, and more drunken disorderly behaviour these past months.

I recognise that the Wilbraham Arms is a popular spot, and appreciate that weekends are great nights for relaxing. I think that the landlord works hard in catering to many different tastes, and is clearly running a successful pub. My intention in writing is not to harm a good business, but to ask that the landlord recognise that being part of a community means respecting neighbours and acting accordingly in creating a creating a positive culture for drinking and entertainment in Nantwich.

I am in receipt of a letter that has been distributed along Welsh Row, it is the equivilant of a witch hunt on the Wilbraham Arms. The letter has foisted all the excesses of anti social behavior, fighting, arguments, that occur along Welsh Row on the Wilbraham Arms.

The Wilbraham Arms by character has always been busy lively meeting place with music at the weekend the same as the old pub further along they have music too, it generates a good atmosphere.

I wish to highlight is that there are other 'New' pubs on Welsh Row which stay open much later and because the Wilbrahams Arms have tables and chairs outside, they are used to rest on by young drunken revellers from other pubs on ther way home and to eat food from one of the seven or eight take-away outlets on the Welsh Row. Red Lion Lane which runs alongside the Wilbrahams is the throughfare to the new big housing estate where the majority of the revellers live. It is my opinion that the Wilbraham Arms are being penalised for other publicans who may restrict who go into their pubs, but do not care what state the customers are in on their way out. Many of their customers are almost unable to walk, it is these revellers that cause all the anti social problems. The regulars that use the Wilbraham Pub are not revellers, they are a mixed age group of local people having a relaxing evening who are now being victimised by a few local residents.

The Welsh Row was a busy mixed commercial and residential community when my husband and I chose to live here 22 years ago. The businesses may have changed but the pubs and the essence of Welsh Row has not. I am now a widow and teetotal, in my unbiased opinion feel the Wilbraham Arms and the other traditional pubs in Welsh Row play an important part in our local community, culture and atmosphere.

The Dabbers of Nantwich are proud of Welsh Row, listed in the Doomsday Book, with its traditional Inns, it has seen battles and plague it is seeped in history and has seeped in beer for over 400 years. Long let it continue!

I believe the protest letters were distributed by an incomer to the town, who on arrival into the town lived at number 79 Welsh Row so they were aware of the pub and its venue when they later purchased the house opposite the Wilbraham Arms.

I do not wish to publish my name but would be willing if requested Please email me if it is required.

I understand that a licensing review is to take place relating to the above premises.

As a near neighbour I must urge that tighter restrictions are imposed on these premises.

My concerns relate to intimidating behaviour from patrons drinking in front of the premises, my wife will no longer go past the pub at night time to post a letter because of the lewd and suggestive behaviour of drinkers outside the pub.

In addition since the new tenants arrived, general noise levels and anti social behaviour have escalated. Graffiti has been chalked outside my home, our car has had its paintwork 'keyed' and an aerial bent. Can surveillance cameras not be directed to the area outside the pub to survey clients as they leave? Why is there no control on the door, as is the case for properties further down Welsh Row? Patrons are drinking to excess as evidenced by vomit and urination in the vicinity of the premises, excess drinking appears not to be curtailed by the landlord

I would suggest that, in this residential area, a strict 11pm closing time and restriction of music to one or two days a week would be more appropriate than the present freedoms that have been and continue to be abused.

Please ensure that confidentiality as to my name and address is not released in relation to this matter as I am concerned about potential reprisal for speaking out.

With reference to the letter regarding licence review for Wilbraham Arms, Welsh Row, Nantwich: Page 87

I have lived next door but one to the pub for 26 years and there have been many problems regarding antisocial behaviour here during all these years. But for the past few months things have got steadily worse. The music and live entertainment over the weekend nights is always too loud, and goes on too long, and during the summer months it was impossible to have my windows open at night.

Because of the smoking ban, many customers are outside at the rear of the pub, as well as at the front on Welsh Row, and the noise of shouting, singing etc is unacceptable. Now that the weather is so much colder, maybe this will deter people from being outside as much as during the summer. I know that at least 4 of my neighbours have made official complaints to the police and/or council but things have not improved. One neighbour has 4 young children and has had trouble with the excessive noise from the rear of the pub, as the children sleep at the back of their property. Some people live even nearer to the pub than I do, and it must be worse for them. Perhaps they are heavy sleepers!

I have not complained until now, as I am not against people having fun. Many nights during my youth in 70s and 80s we had lock-ins at local pubs (no names mentioned) but we always were <u>inside</u> the pub with the doors and windows shut, and I am sure no noise was heard from outside.

2 nights ago on Saturday I was kept awake <u>again</u> until after 2.30am (some nights it's later than this) with the noise, yelling, singing etc on Welsh Row from customers who had been in the pub. This is the same every weekend. Also there is also the nuisance of people urinating and vomiting under the archway outside my property, which is pretty revolting on your own doorstep, and has to be cleaned up by me or one of the neighbours. The situation has been ongoing since the new landlord arrived.

I am not aware how long the drinks are available after 1am, but some customers seem reluctant to leave the area even if they no longer have drinks to consume.

I feel that things would improve if the closing time was 11pm during the week and midnight on Saturdays. I am not sure if other pubs in the town close at the same time, but surely if problems arise something can be done by the council.

This is the first letter of complaint I have sent for years, and although I feel very strongly about this, something tells me that nothing much will be done, and the majority have to suffer because of a minority who cannot control themselves. Many a night I have got out of bed and looked through my window to see what was going on, and seen drunken people fighting, yelling and weaving their way along the road, having first stopped to relieve themselves of their beer in one way or another outside my front door. I feel sure that if a local

councillor lived in my property, something would have been done about this long ago, but us ordinary mortals don't have much of a say in these matters.

I hope many of the local residents make a complaint, and soon we shall have relatively peaceful nights again. Welsh Row is a good place to live, and I am lucky to live in such a nice area, but the pub is definitely spoiling things for those of us unlucky enough to be near it. I am posting the form as well as emailing, so a double complaint from me!

I am writing to ask that the comments I make below are considered during the review of the license for the above named establishment.

During the past few months the situation with anti-social behaviour has reach totally unacceptable levels on Welsh Row. During this time I have been awoken on many occasions (2-3 time a week) in the early hour of the morning by exceptionally noisy and rowdy behaviour. This includes running on the roofs of cars, shouting aggressively, disturbing bins and on one occasion attempting to break into a car. The behaviour of certain individuals is quite clearly due to their state on inebriation. On more than one occasion I have challenge these people only to be verbally abused and my car spat on. I have also had to report incidences to the police (Nantwich Station) on more than one occasion and also had to telephone call the police again in the early hours when a group of drunken men/boys were causing disturbance and destruction. In addition to this I have had half-eaten kebabs pushed through my letter box and have woken to urine on my door step and on another occasion had obscene words daubed all over the pavements. This is not what I expect to have to put up with, in what is ostensibly a residential area. It does appear that the police are either powerless to act or do not bother- either way, it is time that the residents of Welsh Row being listened to.

My further concern is with the loud music which appears to be uncontrolled. Even though I live more than 50m away from the Wilbraham Arms I can often hear music playing when I am in bed. Again, this is unacceptable, especially when the music continues into the late evening and early hours.

One further issue I would wish to bring to your attention is the practice of customers of this establishment drinking in the street. There are one or two tables outside where many customers congregate to drink (often excessively) and smoke. The end results is that the area is littered with cigarette ends and pedestrians are forced to walk through plumes of smelly tobacco smoke. I also have to say that my wife finds this quite intimidating and uncomfortable. Is it not an offence to drink on the street? Even if it is legal, one would have thought that a more appropriate place to congregate outside would be in the area at the rear on the public house, not on the public highway!

In closing I have to say that I am strongly opposed to the current licensing conditions and would respectfully ask that the licence be changed to what would once be considered 'normal licensing hours'- that is closure at 11 pm rather than gone midnight. I would also seek that the landlord is instructed to remove tables from the pavement and discourage his patrons from loitering at the front entrance.

As I have been subject to verbal abuse/intimidation during the past months I would ask that my name and address are kept confidential, as I am concerned about the welfare/safety of both my family and my property.

I am writing to request a change to the licence for the Wilbraham Arms, Welsh Row, Nantwich.

I am writing on behalf of my family and in particular for my four children aged only 4-13 whose lives and well being have been adversely affected by the excessive noise, drunken revelry, obscene language, anti-social behaviour and complete disregard the pub has shown for its neighbours for several months now.

My four boys - who up until recently had to regularly sleep downstairs in our living room in an (often vein) attempt to get away from the incredibly loud music, particularly at weekends and especially on Sunday night/Monday morning — when they most needed their sleep before school the next day. For my youngest, just 4 years old, who started school in September, a time which should have been special, but was turned into a stressful and exhausting experience for him due to constant disruptions to his sleep — evidenced by his Reception teacher commenting on "how tired he always was". For the elder two of my sons who were forced to try to go to sleep with iPods in their ears in an *attempt* to drown out the noise coming from the pub. For all of them, in order not to have to listen to drunken singing, boisterousness, obscene language and extremely graphic sexual conversations. For all of them so they do not have to repeatedly wake up crying about the disturbances and noise coming from the pub.

To not have to resort on more than one occasion to taking them to relatives at weekends in an effort for them to get some rest and peace; such is the level of noise through live entertainment and the masses of drinkers that congregate at the rear (where it has conveniently been out of sight) and front of the pub, peace they have a fundamental entitlement to, peace disturbed by the constant and unrelenting noise until well *after* the pub's official closing time of 1am. Indeed, the record will show that I have been forced to call the police on numerous occasions between 1:30am and often later in an effort to move people on - a duty I thought was the landlords responsibility.

Indeed the evidence from noise logs, sound recordings and my own personal video recordings, (which I am happy to make available for the committee to fully appreciate the level of anti-social behaviour and noise pollution we have reported) will clearly demonstrate how the licensees have in fact shown a continual disregard for their neighbours and the community. Further evidence of this can be cited by the numerous visits both council enforcement officers and police officers have made over the months to try to get the licensees to respect their licence terms and the well being of its neighbours – which I might add have been greeted by a plethora of excuses (such as "they are family and friends" - in response to after hours drinking observed by PC Shaw of Nantwich police station, "It's the air vent, I'll have to do something about it" - Police visit c11pm August Bank Holiday in response by several neighbour complaints about music noise levels), sob stories and pleading for second chances – the last of which in response to a threat to serve a noise abatement notice asked for a fortnight's grace to sort things out but was demonstrated to be nothing more than lip service as proven by the ensuing raucous "beach party" *that very evening* when the licensees true colours and opinions on authority were revealed by some unsavoury remarks about the visiting officers that day – as caught on sound recording equipment.

As a governor of Malbank school, further down Welsh Row, I also have to express my grave concerns regarding the influence of the pub on the young in our community. I have personally witnessed ex-pupils (under 18) frequenting the premises on several occasions. Whether they have consumed alcohol on the premises I cannot say but the fact that they are unsupervised and evidently unchallenged (or at the very least the pub's checks are not rigorous enough) is very troubling. Perhaps more worrying is it is common knowledge amongst many pupils that the Wilbraham Arms "is the place to be" - I will let the committee decide what they might mean by that. I would also add that the sight of drinkers, often inebriated, on the pavement outside the pub all day including when pupils walk home not only sets entirely the wrong example for them but is both intimidating and of course entirely unnecessary. I am only relieved that I do not have any daughters that have to pass the pub at this time! This "al fresco" drinking is certainly not seen in any other pub I can recall throughout Nantwich — certainly not on Welsh Row in the middle of a residential area and certainly not at 3:30 in the afternoon.

Consequently, I wish to cite that the pub has not upheld, met or complied with the objectives under the Licence Act 2003(5) specifically objective #3: "The prevention of public nuisance" nor objective #4: "The protection of children from harm"

In the interests of fairness, the pub's conduct has seemingly improved since the serving of the not one but *two* abatement notices by the council. I can at least comment on the fact that the rear of the premises is mercifully quiet now after 9pm (the notice requiring it to be closed) so that residents like myself, in Red Lion Lane, Welsh Row and beyond can at last enjoy their basic human right to peace and quiet in the evening and in the small hours.

However, it is important to recognise the reason why this review has been instigated – this modest improvement is not down to the licensees' respect to their neighbours or I would suggest any change of heart from them. It is simply that *the law* has obliged them to. Indeed it has taken *the law*, and only the law, to consider the community and their responsibilities towards it and if I might be cynical for a moment, perhaps the impending prospect of the license review itself?

As stated earlier, all attempts by the police, council and neighbours such as myself (I have phoned on several occasions only to have the phone go unanswered or put down on me – then again the fact I was calling at 2am might have led the pub to guess I intended complaining) at getting the pub to be reasonable and considerate to local residents over months of trying has been responded with a demonstration of defiance to the authorities and residents. This is the true nature therefore of the licensees and I would implore the committee to recognise this and put an end to our misery.

I consider myself a reasonable person who respects that the pub is a business – I would not have moved in had I not. I have lived now at the same property for 13 years. The record will show that I have never once in that time ever needed to complain about the pub. Previous landlords/owners/licensees have all respected their neighbours – not one has sought nor indeed thought it appropriate to open the pub to 1 am before. The last landlord, both popular and respected, never let anyone drink outside in the evenings let alone do so in large groups. He exerted a very strong influence and control over clientèle and was ever present. He had live entertainment, sometimes Fridays but every Saturday. *Never* that I can recall though on a *Sunday*. Moreover the entertainment et al always ended at the stroke of midnight (or before) at which point the pub fell totally silent and customers left the premises in a expedient manner. Likewise no-one was ever allowed to drink outside during this time. Sadly, this is simply not the case any more. Until the abatement notices were served – and sound and video evidence will substantiate this - customers were free to come and go as they pleased repeatedly returning in and out of the pub at the back *well passed* the official 1 am closing time. Moreover, they were unsupervised and uncontrolled.

I would therefore suggest that the licensing committee return the pub's licence to that used on a voluntary basis by previous landlords viz. a closure time of 11pm every weekday night, music to be confined to Saturdays, and to ensure no-one suffers sleep deprivation for their forthcoming working or school week, a ban on music on Sunday evenings/Monday mornings coupled with a closing time of 11pm. I would further recommend, as the landlord clearly cannot or does not seem the need to control his customers (I understand for example there is no record kept of anyone who has been barred or not allowed to drink there which I further understand is common and good practice in other pubs), there be some kind of door control instigated. If possible, I would also recommend, to assist the police and neighbours, there be a 20 minute time limit for customers to leave the premises. Again I believe this is nothing less than reasonable and whilst no longer a remit of the current Licensing Act, it is nevertheless seen as good practice and used throughout all other pubs in the area. Indeed, one would beg the question, why would you want your customers to be on the premises any longer than that? Unless of course there was some kind of incentive for them to stay?

The "al fresco" licensing laws introduced by the last government have been widely criticised. The new Home Secretary Theresa May on 5th October 2010 announced "We have just completed a consultation on the Licensing Act, and I can today confirm that we will give local people more control over pubs, clubs and other licensed venues"

This being the case I hope that irrespective of the political persuasions of the committee members, the principles behind this will be recognised and a positive change to the licence terms for the pub will be made. I would also like to add that whilst no-one wishes to see anyone's livelihood affected, it must be remembered that it is the licence holders, through their flagrant defiance of authority and the law over *several months* of being offered chances to change, would be the sole architects of any such detriment a change in licence terms would result in. To this end, and most importantly of all, I hope the committee considers the welfare of the children and youth in the community when it reaches its conclusions and given the evidence, makes this its top priority.
