Sex: adverse impacts on people from a Black and Minority Ethnic background (BAME) Co-morbidity: adversely impacting those with existing health conditions. The expiration / removal of coronavirus regulations, and corresponding updates to the Council's SCI mean that the impact of relying on a digital approach to engagement and consultation alone is no longer relevant as the Council can now employ a full suite of consultation methods including providing hard copies of documents in offices and libraries, in-person meetings and consultation events alongside digital methods. No direct engagement has been carried out, however the changes to the SCI are for the most part limited to removing reference to the expired Coronavirus regulations and the limitations they placed on the Council's planning function. The removal of those limitations enables the Council to expand its ability to consult and engage residents

(This may or may not include the stakeholders listed above)	a digital approach alone had the potential to affect certain groups and therefore the 2022 SCI retained a balance of options for consultation, enabling the council to pursue both digital and in-person methods, albeit with a stronger emphasis on digital methods.
	Reliance on digital engagement alone could affect a range of protected characteristics based on their ability access digital services. The most likely characteristics affected are age and disability. Exploring the UK's Digital Divide, (Office for National Statistics, 2019) identified that over half on non-internet users were over 75 and over half were disabled. The percentage of non-internet users in both groups has been declining in recent years.
	The Cheshire East 2017 Communications Survey (full report is available online at <u>our results webpages</u>) shows a decrease in internet usage by age, with 33% of the over 75s asked never having used the internet at all. Further questions were asked about socio-demographics; however the report and analysis did not include this specifically on internet use.
	 The ONS Internet use survey (2019) estimated 11% of residents in Cheshire East either used the internet more than 3 months ago or had never used it, this would equate to around 34,000 residents. There are no further Cheshire East specific breakdowns – the number of responses by local authority is too low – however, more generally the survey finds (NOTE these are national findings): Non-users were typically more likely to be female
	 Older residents were more likely not to be users – 13% of males and 14% of females aged 65-74 had never used the internet or used it more than 3 months ago, 40% of men and 52% of females aged 75+ Conversely younger respondents were much less likely to have never used, less than 1% for both males and
	 females for those aged 16 to 44 Respondents who were defined as per the Equality Act as disabled were more likely to have never used the internet or used it more than 3 months ago (18%) vs those who were not defined as disabled (4%) Unemployed residents were more likely not have not used the internet in the last 3 months or never (2.3%) compared to those who were either employed (1.2%) or self employed (2.1%). Those who were economically active – people looking after family or not actively seeking work perhaps due to a disability or some other reason – were more likely not have not used the internet in the last 3 months or never (11.0%)
	Therefore, whilst digital consultation methods will continue to form an important part of the councils engagement with stakeholders, the resumption of in person meetings and consultation events, alongside the ability to access copies of documents either on screen or as a hard copy (within the councils offices and libraries) will improve the ability of those who may struggle to access digital services, to participate in planning consultations.
