Procedure for Hearings – Licensing Act 2003

The Licensing Committee

The full Licensing Committee consists of fifteen elected Members of the Council. From this full Committee will be drawn sub-committees of three members to deal with licensing functions under the Licensing Act 2003. The Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Licensing Committee shall have the discretion to refer a matter up to a hearing of the full Licensing Committee.

Officers at Hearings

- The Committee Officer introduces all parties and records the proceedings
- **The Legal Adviser** provides independent advice to the Members on legal matters and procedure.
- **The Licensing Officer** will introduce the matter and outline the application; the officer will also answer any questions Members may have.

<u>Notes</u>

- 1. The hearing shall normally be held in public. There may be occasions on which the Committee find it necessary to exclude members of the press and public; any such decision will be taken on the basis that the public interest in doing so outweighs the public interest in the hearing, or that part of the hearing taking place in public.
- 2. The Chairman may require any person behaving in a disruptive manner to leave the hearing and may (a) refuse to permit that person to return, or (b) permit him/her to return only on such conditions as the authority may specify, but any such person may submit in writing any information which they would have been entitled to provide orally if they had not been required to leave.
- Prior to the hearing each party shall have given notification and served documentation (eg statements of witnesses or reports of experts) as required. Late representations and evidence will only be considered with the agreement of all parties.
- 4. Anyone entitled to be heard may be represented by any person, whether or not that person is legally qualified.
- 5. Hearsay will be permitted but the Sub-Committee will be reminded to give it appropriate weight.
- 6. Due note shall be taken of the provisions of the Hearings Regulations 2005.
- 7. The Chair may, in the interests of expediency or convenience of the parties, vary the procedure from time to time, provided notice is given to the parties and the rules of natural justice are observed.

Summary of Procedure

- 1. Chairman appointed (if this has not been done previously).
- 2. Chairman to call for declarations of interest and request that all parties introduce themselves.
- 3. Chairman summarises the procedure for the hearing
- 4. The Licensing Officer summarises the application
- 5. Applicant to present his/her case.
- 6. Applicant to be questioned by all parties (to clarify points only) following which, he/she can clarify any other matters which he/she feels may have been misunderstood when the application was presented.
- 7. Applicant to be questioned by the Committee.
- 8. Responsible Authorities to make their representations following which they can be questioned by all parties by way of clarification.
- 9. Other Persons will be invited to present the bases of their objections, following which they can be questioned by all parties by way of clarification.
- 10. The applicant will be invited to sum up his/her case
- 11. Committee/Sub-Committee withdraws to make its decision
- 12. Committee/Sub-Committee returns to announce its decision to all present.

1. Report Summary

1.1. The report provides details of an application for a Premises Licence, and the proposed operating schedule together with details of relevent representations received in relation to the application.

2. Recommendations

2.1. The Licensing Act Sub-Committee is requested to determine the application for a Premises Licence by Laturka Bistro Ltd, in respect of:

Unit 3, Castle Street, Macclesfield, Cheshire, SK11 6AF

- 2.2. Acting in the capacity of Licensing Authority, Members must seek to promote the Licensing Objectives. And where Members consider that matters have engages one or more of the Objectives, they may exercise their discretion. The Licensing Objectives are:
 - a) The prevention of crime and disorder
 - b) Public Safety
 - c) The prevention of public nuisance
 - d) The protection of children from harm
- 2.3. Members of the Licensing Sub-Committee are reminded that they may not exercise discretion in any case, merely because it considers it desirable to do so. Careful consideration should be given to the application and the evidence presented by the parties in relation to the review.

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- 2.4. Finally, Members are also reminded that in determining the application, consideration also needs to be given to:
 - a) The rules of natural justice
 - b) The provisions of the Human Rights Act 1998

The Licensing Act Sub-Committee has the power to determine this application in accordance with the provisions of the Licensing Act 2003 and the Council's Constitution, and provide the key reasons why the recommendation/s has been made. 5. Background

- 5.1. The application was received by the Licensing Authority and sent out for consultation on the 9th August 2019. The application is for a new Premises Licence under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 5.2. The operating schedule indicates that the relevant licensable activities applied for are:

To permit the provision of Live Music Indoors Sunday to Thursdsay 20.00 – 00.00 Friday and Saturday 20.00 – 01.00

To permit the provision of Recorded Music Indoors Sunday to Wednesday 08.30 – 00.00 Thursday 08.30 – 00.30 Friday and Saturday 08.30 – 01.30

To permit the provision of Performances of Dance Sunday to Thursday 19.00 – 00.00 Friday and Saturday 19.00 – 01.30

To permit the provision of Late Night Refreshment Sunday to Wednesday 23.00 – 00.00 Thursday 23.00 – 00.30 Friday and Saturday 23.00 – 01.30

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To permit the Sale and Supply of Alcohol on and off the premises Monday to Sunday 11.00 – 23.00

- 5.3. Members should take into consideration the Licensing Act 2003 Schedule 1 (7A) whereby the provision of recorded music in an alcohol licensed premises for an audience of less than 500 people between the hours of 08.00 and 23.00 is not to be regarded as the provision of regulated entertainment for the purposes of Section 16.6 of the Guidance issued under Section 182 (Issued in April 2018) of the Licensing Act 2003. Additionally, any conditions attached to a licence that relate to deregulated entertainment would be suspended between the hours of 08:00 and 23:00, provided that appropriate but relevant conditions are put in place as Members deem fitting.
- 5.4. A copy of the application form is attached as Appendix 1.
- 5.5. Responsible Authorities:
 - 5.5.1. The Council's Environmental Protection team have not submitted a representation
 - 5.5.2. Cheshire Police have proposed conditions to be included in the application which have been agreed by the applicant. A copy of the conditions is attached at Appendix 2
- 5.6 Other Persons:
 - 5.6.1 The Council has received three representations from the public, which are set out at Appendix 3

6. Implications of the Recommendations

6.1. Legal Implications

- 6.1.1. In accordance with the provisions of section 18 of the Licensing Act 2003 the Licensing Authority must, having regard to the representations, take such steps (if any) as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. Section 18(4) provides that the authority may:
 - I. Grant the licence subject to the relevant mandatory conditions and conditions consistent with the operating schedule
 - II. Modify the application to such extent as the Authority considers appropriate for the promotion of the Licensing Objectives

- III. Exclude from the scope of the licence any of the Licensable Activities to which the application relates
- IV. Reject the application
- 6.1.2 Members are reminded that should any conditions be added, they should be practical, enforceable and appropriate to promote the Licensing Objectives.
- 6.1.3 Members are also reminded of the statutory obligation placed on the Local Authority under section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to exercise its various functions, doing all that it can to prevent Crime and disorder, and Anti-social Behaviour, behaviour adversely affecting the environment as well the misuse of drugs, alcohol and re-offending in the Local Environment.

COMMENTS:

The application makes reference to CCTV being installed at the premises with recording if required, for clarity the condition is to read as follows:

Condition:

A CCTV system shall be used and shall be designed and installed in accordance with the Cheshire Constabulary's CCTV guidance document called 'CCTV in Licensed Premises – An Operational Requirement'. This system shall be in operation at all times when licensable activities are taking place.

Recorded CCTV images will be maintained and stored for a period of twenty-eight days and shall be produced to the Police or Licensing Authority upon request.

Designated supervisors will need to demonstrate that their CCTV system complies with their Operational requirements. Management at the premises will need to be able to demonstrate the following:-

- Recordings are fit for their intended purpose,
- Good quality images are presented to the officer in a format that can be replayed on a standard computer
- The supervisor has an understanding of the equipment/training,
- Management records are kept,
- Maintenance agreements and records are maintained,
- Data Protection principles and signage are in place.

Because of the late hours requested by the premises particularly around the Christmas/New Year it is recommended that the management carry out weekly risk assessments on whether door staff should be employed at the premises. Therefore the following condition is to apply:

Condition:

When the premises are open beyond 01:00 or when there is any specific local event, or around the festive season, the Premises Licence Holder or Designated Premises Supervisor shall conduct an assessment of the need for door supervisors, taking into account any advice offered by the Police. Where the assessment shows that door supervision is required, supervisors shall be engaged at such times and ratios as are assessed to be necessary.

When such Door supervision is employed:-

Condition:

A written record shall be kept on the premises by the Designated Premises Supervisor of every person employed on the premises as a door supervisor in a register kept for that purpose. That record shall contain the following details:-

- The door supervisor's name, date of birth and home address;
- His/her Security Industry Authority licence number;
- The time and date he/she starts and finishes duty;
- The time of any breaks taken whilst on duty;
- Each entry shall be signed by the door supervisor.
- Record of all incidents taking place in the venue

That register shall be available for inspection on demand by an Authorised Officer of the Council, the Security Industry Authority or a Police Constable.

Prevention of Children from Harm

The application makes reference to there being an age verification policy in use Challenge 25, so for clarity the following condition is to apply:

Condition:

A "Challenge 25" policy shall be operated at the premises at all times.

The only forms of ID that shall be accepted (at the discretion of the Management) as proof of age are a valid passport, a valid photographic driving licence, a PASS approved proof of age card, HM Services Warrant Card or other reliable photo ID (that has been approved for acceptance by the Police or an Officer of the Local Authority)

Publicity materials notifying customers of the operation of the "Challenge 25" scheme shall be displayed at the premises.

The Designated Premises Supervisor or Premises Licence Holder shall operate and maintain an up-to-date Register of Refusals of Sale of Alcohol, indicating the date, time and reason for refusal which shall be made available for inspection by Local Authority Officers and the Police. The DPS or other responsible person shall check and sign the register once a week.

Alternatively an electronic point of sale refusals log shall be kept.

A documented training programme shall be introduced for all staff in a position to sell, serve or deliver alcohol. A written record for each member of staff shall be kept of the content of such training and shall be made available for inspection at the request of Local Authority Officers and Police.

The DPS or Premises Licence Holder shall conduct six monthly training reviews with all members of staff authorised to sell, serve or deliver alcohol in order to reinforce the training and to promote best practice. A written record for each member of staff shall be kept of the content of such reviews and shall be made available for inspection at the request of Local Authority Officers and Police.

The above name residents have asked me to make a representation (objection) on their behalf on the **APPLICATION FOR A PREMISES LICENCE: LICENSING ACT 2003** made by LaTurka Bar and Grill, Unit 3, Castle Street, Macclesfield, SK11 6AF.

The reason that they have asked me to do this is that they all submitted representations on the application and all received the following response from 'The Licensing Team':

"Unfortunately, your email cannot be considered in relation to this application as your email of representation is based on speculation and the points you raise are not considered valid objections to the application.

To be received as a valid **representation** you must set out how you consider the application will undermine the licensing objectives, which are Prevention of Crime and Disorder, Public Safety, Public Nuisance and Protection of Children from Harm.

When they clicked on the above link an 'Error 404 page does not exist' was displayed so they had no means of following the guidance notes. I believe that the correct link is <u>https://www.cheshireeast.gov.uk/pdf/guidance_on_making_a_representation_v3.pdf</u>

It is unacceptable for the residents to have been given misleading information particularly a couple of days before the closing date of midnight 7th September 2019, which is why they have approached me.

I have taken their individual comments, collated them and attempted to put them under the appropriate licensing objectives.

Please note that the comments are not speculative and are based on living at the above addresses for many years.

The prevention of crime and disorder

Concerns are that the premises are well away from the main bar/club areas in Macclesfield, and that any disorder would not be dealt with in a timely manner as police presence at

weekend is concentrated around the lower end of Mill Street. There are no other licensed premises in this area.

Public safety

The hours of business of the above premises, open till 3.00 in the mornings, will prevent residents from approaching anyone who was making a noise as in their experience people out in the early hours are intoxicated and aggressive and they would not feel safe doing so.

The prevention of public nuisance

Some of the following issues already occur but not late at night/early hours of the morning as per the proposed opening hours, and will be made worse by customers/staff leaving the premises

- noise disturbance from additional cars and taxis (there is no public transport late at night)
- noise disturbance from people walking across Churchill Way car park
- People walk across Churchill Way car park on their way out of town, there are occasionally loud arguments and disorderly behaviour causing disturbance to residents
- The applicant has not indicated what time refuse collection and deliveries will be made. There was an issue with Veolia operating locally in the early hours (3 a.m., 4 a.m.) that was dealt with Environmental Health about 3 years ago.
- The proposed opening times are inappropriate due to the close proximity of residential properties in Water Street, Great King Street and neighbouring areas. Due to the size of Unit 3 it is reasonable to assume that a great many more people will be out in the early hours making noise and adversely impacting residential amenity
- The proximity of Churchill Way car park to the premises and subsequent increase in very late night vehicle movements. It is currently very quiet in the evening.
- This will have a real impact on my quality of life as a resident of Water Street (reasons above)
- Notices asking customers to be quiet when leaving licensed premises after consuming alcohol people are not effective, as evidenced by occasional disturbances outside the houses, and it is reasonable to assume that this will get worse and happen in the early hours. The impact of sleep loss on residents who have to get up for work, take children to school, and on the children themselves, is unacceptable. The properties on Water Street are directly on the pavement and next to the car park and most likely to be adversely affected.
- Other nightclubs are located in lower Mill Street and Pickford Street, not as a standalone close to houses, keeping the parties on one area, not spread out all over Macclesfield would help meet the prevention of public nuisance objective.
- Concerns are that the premises are well away from the main bar/club areas in Macclesfield, and that any disorder would not be dealt with in a timely manner as police presence at weekend is concentrated around the lower end of Mill Street. There are no other licensed premises in this area.

The protection of children from harm

It is not clear whether this means children on the premises or those living nearby. There are young school age children living on Water Street and surrounding streets, and any threat to their wellbeing by loss of sleep due to additional noise, be it from vehicles, people or music, is not acceptable. The proposed opening hours for the premises make it reasonable to assume that night-time/early hours of the morning disturbances will occur, intentionally or unintentionally. There is a risk of exposure to seeing and hearing aggressive behaviour, such as is prevalent around the other nightclubs in Macclesfield in the early hours.

Please be advised that I will be submitting a separate representation also.

I wish to make a representation (objection) on the **APPLICATION FOR A PREMISES LICENCE: LICENSING ACT 2003** made by LaTurka Bar and Grill, Unit 3, Castle Street, Macclesfield, SK11 6AF.

My objections mainly relate to the proposed opening hours.

In addition to the Licensing objectives I wish to point out that guidance in

http://www.gov.uk/government/publications/section-182-of-the-licensing-act-2003-amended-guidance

does not appear to have been followed i.e.

Considering cases where licensing and planning applications are made simultaneously

9.41 Where businesses have indicated, when applying for a licence under the 2003 Act, that

they have also applied for planning permission or that they intend to do so, licensing committees and officers should consider discussion with their planning counterparts prior to determination with the aim of agreeing mutually acceptable operating hours and scheme designs.

As one of the Ward councillors I received an email on 7th August 2019 with notification of a pre-planning application PRE/1624/19 for the above premises. I **responded** 8th August stating that I wished to be involved in any discussions. As of today (7th Sept) I have not received any further communication.

The premises have approved usage classes of B1(a), A1, A2, A3 and/or A4 but the license application appears to be for a nightclub, given the proposed very late hours of operation and performance of live music, recorded music, dancing and DJ which is outside the approved usage.

Therefore, in my opinion, the License Application should not be considered in isolation, particularly given the impact on existing residential amenity and the fact that approval has been given for residential units in Craven House which is within a stone's throw of the premises.

I have referenced sections of the Home Office document 'Amended Guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003' and commented where I believe there are issues with the application.

Prevention of crime and disorder

2.3 Conditions should be targeted on deterrence and preventing crime and disorder.

For example, where there is good reason to suppose that disorder may take place, the

presence of closed-circuit television (CCTV) cameras both inside and immediately outside

the premises can actively deter disorder, nuisance, anti-social behaviour and crime generally. Some licence holders may wish to have cameras on their premises for the prevention of crime directed against the business itself, its staff, or its customers. But any

condition may require a broader approach, and it may be appropriate to ensure that the

precise location of cameras is set out on plans to ensure that certain areas are properly

covered and there is no subsequent dispute over the terms of the condition.

It is not clear on the plans that this has been done, and this should be a condition regardless of opening hours.

2.4 The inclusion of radio links and ring-round phone systems should be considered an

appropriate condition for public houses, bars and nightclubs operating in city and town centre leisure areas with a high density of licensed premises. These systems allow

managers of licensed premises to communicate instantly with the police and facilitate a

rapid response to any disorder which may be endangering the customers and staff on

the premises.

As the premises are outside the main area of pubs and clubs (none in the immediate vicinity) I am concerned about police reaction time as police presence is concentrated in the lower end of Mill Street

Public safety

2.9 A number of matters should be considered in relation to public safety. These may include:

• Fire safety;

• Ensuring appropriate access for emergency services such as ambulances;

• Good communication with local authorities and emergency services, for example communications networks with the police and signing up for local incident alerts (see paragraph 2.4 above);

• Ensuring the presence of trained first aiders on the premises and appropriate first aid

kits;

• Ensuring the safety of people when leaving the premises (for example, through the provision of information on late-night transportation);

Ensuring appropriate and frequent waste disposal, particularly of glass bottles;
Ensuring appropriate limits on the maximum capacity of the premises (see paragraphs

2.13-2.15, and Chapter 10; and

• Considering the use of CCTV in and around the premises (as noted in paragraph 2.3

above, this may also assist with promoting the crime and disorder objective).

As per para 2.4 Public nuisance

2.18 The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to

prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises

certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those

carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate

and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious

smells and litter.

Please see the representation that I made on behalf of Water Street residents and include in this section. All issues stated are disproportionate and unreasonable due to the impact of noise on residential amenity. Also given that this is a large club it is not clear how noxious smells from cooking would be mitigated.

2.19 Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however

not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It is important to remember that the prevention of public nuisance could therefore include low level nuisance, perhaps affecting a few people living locally, as well as major disturbance

affecting the whole community. It may also include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of other persons living and

working in the area of the licensed premises. Public nuisance may also arise as a result

of the adverse effects of artificial light, dust, odour and insects or where its effect is prejudicial to health.

This application certainly impacts existing local residents due to the highly likely reduction in living amenity, plus any future residents of Craven House.

2.21 As with all conditions, those relating to noise nuisance may not be appropriate in certain

circumstances where provisions in other legislation adequately protect those living in the

area of the premises. But as stated earlier in this Guidance, the approach of licensing

authorities and responsible authorities should be one of prevention and when their powers

are engaged, licensing authorities should be aware of the fact that other legislation may

not adequately cover concerns raised in relevant representations and additional conditions

may be appropriate.

There is no evidence of a preventative approach, given that nothing has been progressed with the pre-planning application.

2.22 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions

should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, music noise from premises usually occurs from mid-evening until either late-evening or early-morning when

residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise immediately surrounding the premises

may also prove appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter

and leave.

The Licensing Team dismissed concerns from local residents around anticipated noise as 'speculative' which would appear to be at odds with this guidance, I refer again to the representation made by myself on behalf of residents and urge that they are considered.

2.24 Beyond the immediate area surrounding the premises, these are matters for the personal responsibility of individuals under the law. An individual who engages in anti-social behaviour is accountable in their own right. However, it would be perfectly reasonable for a licensing authority to impose a condition, following relevant representations, that requires the licence holder or club to place signs at the exits from

the building encouraging patrons to be quiet until they leave the area and to respect the

rights of people living nearby to a peaceful night.

I understand that the applicant intends to do this, however given the long hours applied for I doubt the effectiveness. The area is so quiet at night that vehicle noise alone would be an issue

Steps to promote the licensing objectives

8.33 In completing an operating schedule, applicants are expected to have regard to the

statement of licensing policy for their area. They must also be aware of the expectations

of the licensing authority and the responsible authorities as to the steps that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, and to demonstrate knowledge

of their local area when describing the steps they propose to take to promote the licensing objectives. Licensing authorities and responsible authorities are expected to

publish information about what is meant by the promotion of the licensing objectives

and to ensure that applicants can readily access advice about these matters. However,

applicants are also expected to undertake their own enquiries about the area in which the

premises are situated to inform the content of the application.

As stated, as ward councillor I am not aware of any enquiries from the applicant, and pre-panning discussions have not taken place, showing a lack of promotion of licensing objectives.

8.34 Applicants are, in particular, expected to obtain sufficient information to enable them to

demonstrate, when setting out the steps they propose to take to promote the licensing

objectives, that they understand:

• the layout of the local area and physical environment including crime and disorder hotspots, proximity to residential premises and proximity to areas where children may

congregate;

• any risk posed to the local area by the applicants' proposed licensable activities; and

• any local initiatives (for example, local crime reduction initiatives or voluntary schemes

including local taxi-marshalling schemes, street pastors and other schemes) which may

help to mitigate potential risks.

The submitted map fails to show the proximity of residential properties and does not fully address the potential impact with regard to the public nuisance objective.

8.35 Applicants are expected to include positive proposals in their application on how they

will manage any potential risks. Where specific policies apply in the area (for example, a

cumulative impact policy), applicants are also expected to demonstrate an understanding

of how the policy impacts on their application; any measures they will take to mitigate the

impact; and why they consider the application should be an exception to the policy.

The proposals seem to be generic and the very long hours applied for show no regard for public nuisance impact on local residents.

8.36 It is expected that enquiries about the locality will assist applicants when determining

the steps that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. For example,

premises with close proximity to residential premises should consider how this impact

upon their smoking, noise management and dispersal policies to ensure the promotion of

the public nuisance objective. Applicants must consider all factors which may be relevant

to the promotion of the licensing objectives, and where there are no known concerns, acknowledge this in their application

The submitted map fails to show the proximity of residential properties and does not fully address the potential impact with regard to the public nuisance objective. Finally, the Protection of Children from Harm objective:

It is not clear whether this means children on the premises or those living nearby. There are young school age children living on Water Street and surrounding streets, and any threat to their wellbeing by loss of sleep due to additional noise, be it from vehicles, people or music, is not acceptable. The proposed opening hours for the premises make it reasonable to assume that night-time/early hours of the morning disturbances will occur, intentionally or unintentionally. There is a risk of exposure to seeing and hearing aggressive behaviour, such as is prevalent around the other nightclubs in Macclesfield in the early hours.

- The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
- As this application is for a licence to supply alcohol for consumption on and off the premises at times from 11.00am up until 23.00pm and on occasion until 02.30am it is considered that whilst the consumption on the premises could be monitored any consumption immediately outside the premises would not be. It appears from this licence application that it is the intention of the applicants to provide music, dancing and refreshments after the sale of alcohol has finished for the night. Is this dancing as entertainment or as an associated facility for the patrons? Would such refreshments include alcohol?
- Public Safety

It is considered that no tables and chairs should be allowed to be placed on the footpath on Castle Street to the external frontage of the property. This would be an obstruction of the public highway.

The Prevention of Public Nuisance

As it is the intention of the applicant to provide music inside the premises it should be considered unacceptable to hear such music outside the premises as late at night any such noise would travel and possibly cause a nuisance to existing residential properties that are within sight and sound/earshot.

• The Protection of Children from Harm As young children live in some of the existing residential properties that are near to Castle Street it should be a consideration that they would not be disturbed in the evenings when they would be asleep.
