| Brief Description of Decision | To invest £490,000 from the MTFS to Everybody Health and Leisure to fund 2 padel courts at Wilmslow Leisure Centre and 4 padel courts at the |

Reasons for the Decision and alternatives considered

Barony Sports Complex to support the Strategic Leisure Review Requirements to Deliver Management Fee Reductions in 2025-26 of £50,000 per annum.

The Strategic Leisure Review - Final Proposals agreed at the 11 March 2024 committee contained a program of Capital investment to deliver revenue savings though reductions in the Councils Management fee.

As part of this investment strategy contained within Appendix C of the report proposals were provided for:

- Wilmslow LC Development of indoor/outdoor provision £250k
- Nantwich LC -extension to gym / convert old changing area to additional usable space £1.2m

Since then, proposals have been developed for Wilmslow and The Barony. In addition, Everybody Health Leisure (EHL) have undertaken a significant amount of market research and used their experience from the Alderley Park (not part of operating agreement) padel courts to understand financials and performance.

This proposal therefore aligns with the Committee decision and strategic leisure review MTFS requirements drawing down £490,000 capital from the £1million Strategic Leasure Review allocation for 2025-26 to contribute to MTFS required reductions for 2025-26 against leisure services. The proposals cover the cost of capital borrowing with additional contribution to the Council as part of these proposals.

EHL will be managing the supply chain, with prior agreement on contract practice between EHL and CEC Assets team. Any financial risk arising from costs exceeding the allocated £490,000 will be borne solely by EHL.

Maintenance of new infrastructure created by this capital investment will be the responsibility of Everybody Health and Leisure. At the end of the contact in 2029 the asset returns to the contractor The typical lifespan of a padel court surface is **between 5 to 10 years**, depending on usage and maintenance.

| | Initial investment will be used for the Introduction of Padel Courts to support the health and sporting offer to Cheshire East residents. |
| | Padel is more commercially beneficial than Pickleball and is faster growing. Padel courts are rapidly gaining popularity due to their accessibility and inclusive nature, resulting in growing public demand across the Borough. Currently, both The Barony Sports Complex and Wilmslow Leisure Centre have older courts that are no longer in use due to their condition. These facilities are now seeking to redevelop these spaces into padel courts for public use. |
| | Both sites are on Cheshire East Councils property which is operated by Everybody Health and Leisure and so will support to increase revenue to the organisation and so no other alternatives have been considered. Such investments are essential to retain and grow membership. |
| | EHL have now entered into a contract with Padel Ventures to install the padel courts. |
| Member consultation and interests declared | £3.55m capital investment programme was approved for Nantwich and Wilmslow (indoor and outdoor facilities) during March 2024 Environment and Communities committee. Further informal briefing was shared with the committee in October 2024 for formal sign off. |

- award of any contract to carry out the works for the padel courts should be vetted to ensure compliance with any applicable procurement regulations. There is a reference: "EHL will be managing the supply chain, with prior agreement on contract practice between EHL and CEC Assets team" but the Council's procurement team may be best placed to advise as to procurement route.
- if the contract works are to be done on Council owned land, oversight of the contract process is important as the Council would be best advised to ensure that collateral warranties are obtained from the supplier carrying out the works.

Financial Implications

From follow up discussions the following points have been confirmed:

- It is Everybody health and leisure's responsibility to ensure this is a sound business proposal against any alternatives including the review of the proposed costs.
- CEC as commissioner is releasing strategic capital funds allocated against management fee reductions under the leisure review to meet objectives of that review.
- EHL are responsible for delivery of the schemes and any cost overrun.

From a Finance perspective the Strategic Leisure Review capital budget for 2025/26 is sufficient to meet this cost and this will result in reductions in the annual management fee from 2026/27.
